



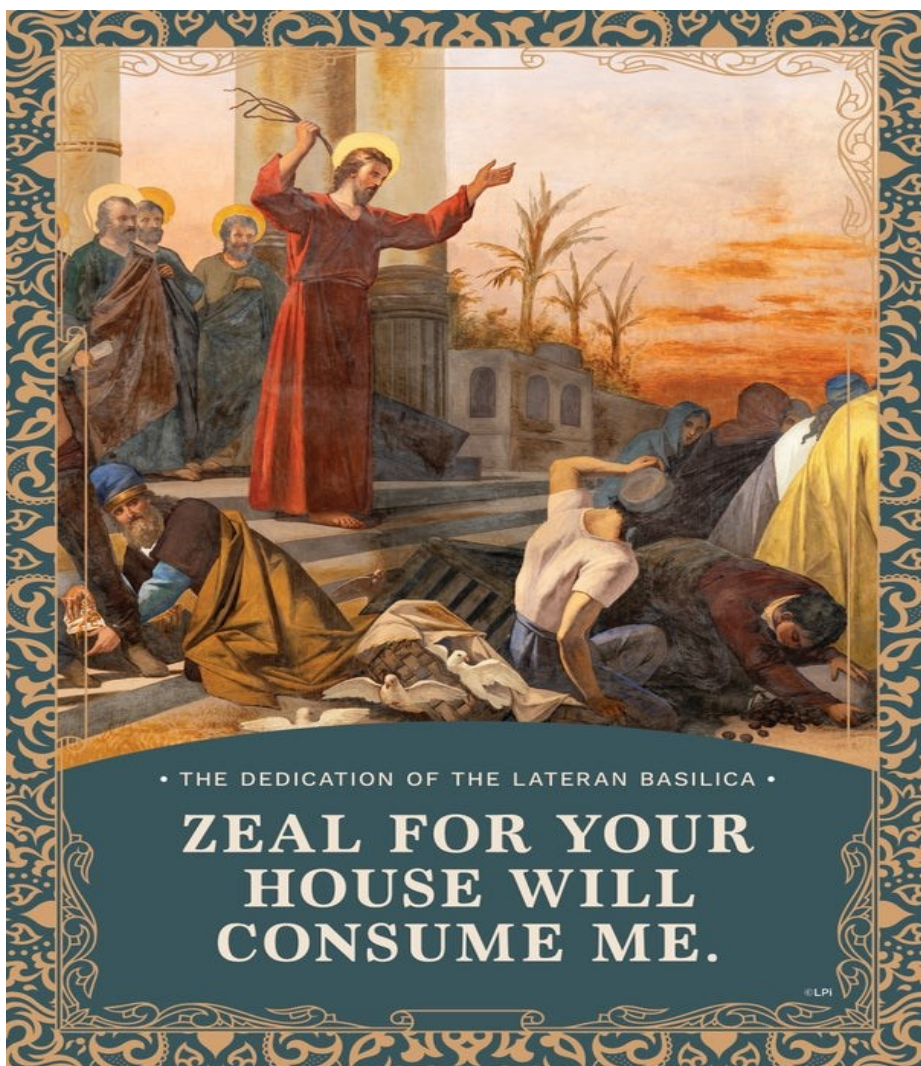

Message from the Pastor

WILSON FAMILY TRAGEDY: Last week, Michael, Heather, and Emily Wilson, and Rosemary Hill, lost their house, their possessions, and their family pet in a terrible fire. They lost everything, but were able to escape with their lives. We can all help them rebuild their home and their lives by contributing to a GOFUNDME page at GoFundMe.com and search for “posie hill.” If you are not able to use the GoFundMe page, you can place your donation in an envelope marked “Wilson Family” and place it in the collection basket. We will then forward the money on to the family with a check from the church. Thank you for your generosity in this terrible tragedy.

ST. TERESA CEMETERY: A number of people have approached me about a recent obituary that stated St. Teresa Cemetery is closed. Saint Teresa Cemetery is not closed. We are grateful to our cemetery staff for the great work they do sometimes under trying circumstances and inclement weather.

SACRAMENTALS AND SACRAMENTS: I have deliberately not mentioned the seven sacraments of the Church in this reflection on sacraments in order to develop a clear idea of what sacramental symbols are and how they are found in our experiences of everyday life, even if we don’t call them sacraments.

We all express what we are through what we do. We express our roles as mothers and fathers by the way we take care of our children. We express who we are as business people and professionals by doing our jobs. We express who we are as Catholics by being involved in our parish or some kind of ministry.

A similar thing is true of communities and institutions: they express who they are by what they do. Families express who they are by how they interact with each other and the things they do together. Restaurants serve as places to eat, factories serve as places to make things, schools are places where children learn, and hospitals are places where aid is given to those who are sick or injured.

Sometimes communities go a step further by expressing what they are on special occasions. Businesses, sports teams, military groups all have moments where they recognize the good work that people are doing with awards and ceremonies. Schools hold graduations. Families celebrate holidays and birthdays with special meals and gatherings. As Christians we observe Lent and Easter, Advent and Christmas, and feasts of various saints and holy people.

In these and many other ways we express who we are as members of these groups and organizations.

The church’s seven sacraments are like this. We believe that Jesus instituted sacraments in a variety of ways. We see how new members are initiated through baptism, how we share bread and wine to celebrate the presence of Jesus and the mystery of his death and resurrection, and we celebrate confirming our faith by prayer, service and study. As the Body of Christ, we have developed other sacraments that express who we are as Christ’s living presence in the world. Jesus as a sacramental person founded a Church that continues to be his Body and his presence through these seven ritual actions we call sacraments.

Let me take a brief look at each sacrament now and later examine each one in depth.

Baptism receives new members into the church and immerses the person into the mystery of Jesus’ death and resurrection. Jesus called people to convert from the ways of the world to the ways of God.

Confirmation goes back to Jesus because he was filled with the Holy Spirit in his life and ministry. He also promised and gave the Holy Spirit to his disciples and the early Church to continue his ministry on earth. The apostles continued to invoke the Holy Spirit upon the early Church through the laying on of hands and the anointing with oil.

Eucharist (often called the Mass) originated at the Last Supper where Jesus commanded us to celebrate this meal in memory of him. This meal celebrates the presence of Jesus that is still with us.

Penance, Reconciliation, or Confession has its roots in Jesus’ practice of forgiving people of their sins. Eventually, the Church developed a formal way to celebrate this forgiveness of Jesus. It is a reminder that we are a reconciling Church.

Anointing of the Sick has its roots in Jesus’ healing ministry and how the Church today is meant to be a healing community. Most often today, caring for the sick is done by family members, hospitals, or healthcare facilities. The anointing of the sick reminds those struggling with illness that God is still with them and is bringing both physical and spiritual healing.

Marriage celebrates how love is permanent, faithful, and life giving. Marriage mirrors the love of God that is permanent, faithful and life giving. God indeed blesses this love and the commitment spouses make to each other.

Ordination embodies the call of Jesus to “Come, follow me.” Priests, deacons and bishops are all ordained to serve the Body of Christ, the Church, through preaching the Word, administering the sacraments and teaching in Jesus’ name.

Think about how each of these sacraments has been celebrated in your life and in the lives of others. Think about how the Mass, baptisms, weddings, penance services, anointing of the sick rituals, confirmations, and ordinations embody what we are called to be as Christians. Think about how these events speak about the meaning, purpose and prophetic nature of the Catholic Church.

As Christians, we believe these sacraments are revealed in the

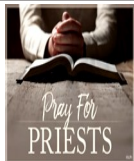

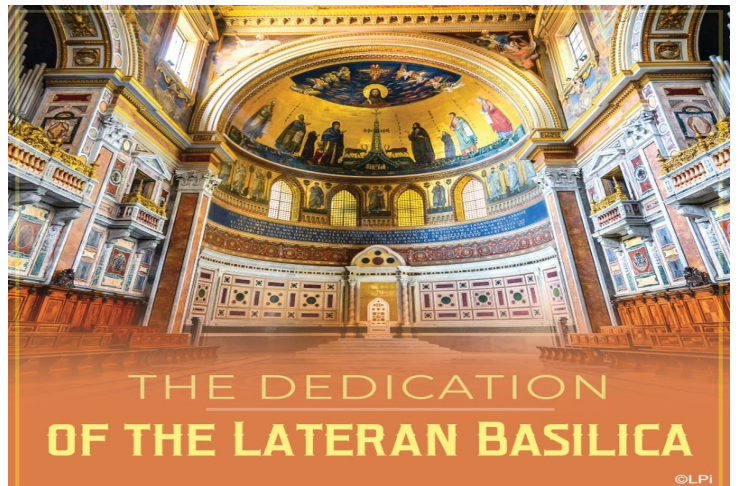
Jesus reminds us that the day will come for ‘the children of God’ where the complications of our earthly life will no longer matter. Just as parents recognize the sound of their children’s voices, when you call out “Lord,” will God say, “Who’s there?”

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments— Know the Warning Signs of a Predator: Perpetrators are not waiting on the street to snatch kids; only 10% of sexually abused children are abused by strangers. 90% are abused by someone known and trusted by the child/child’s family. Perpetrators integrate themselves into everyone’s life, not just the child. They build relationships so that they are trusted to be alone with the child. One of the most important ways to ensure the safety of children in our environments is to know the warning signs of adults who present a risk of harm to children. Among these signs are when the person (1) always wants to be alone with a child in areas where no one can monitor the interactions, (2) allows a child to do things their parents would not permit, (3) is always more excited to be with children than with adults, and (4) discourages others from participating in activities involving kids. THANK YOU: Thanks to our ushers and music ministers who have been counting the number of people at Mass, as we do every October. It was interesting that the numbers at each Mass averaged out differently than last year, but the total number of people at Mass each week was exactly the same as last year, 299. It is interesting to note that we have 543 registered families and 1065 members but only 299 attend mass on a weekend.
