Message from the Pastor

<u>POPE FRANCIS</u>: The death of Pope Francis is a moment of great sadness for us, for the church, and for our world. There are few leaders in our world whose death creates such mourning and speculation. May this be a time when we pray for Pope Francis, his family and friends in the time of their mourning. May we also pray for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the cardinals who will gather in the Conclave to elect a successor to Pope Francis. The challenge of being Pope is one that can only be met with the help of the Holy Spirit.

Francis has certainly been a Pope who has revealed the human side of the Church and invited us to be more open and welcoming. He has been a strong advocate for the poor and the immigrant, the marginalized and the neglected. Francis has brought some important reform to the government of the Vatican and an openness to dialogue with other faiths and traditions, particularly those of the Muslim faith. Francis has helped us understand how the church needs to be synodal - how we need to dialogue with one another in order to solve our problems and to achieve the peace we long for.

HOLY WEEK SERVICES: A huge thank you goes out to our liturgy committee for planning such a prayerful holy week. Their efforts were supported by the tremendous work of our musicians and choir members, our liturgical ministers (lectors, ushers, eucharistic ministers, altar servers, confirmation students, deacons), those who volunteered to set up and take down after each service, and our parish staff who helped to coordinate the various aspects of this week. As with everything we do here, there is a lot of behind the scenes work that most people do not know about. I offer my sincere thanks to everyone who played a part in making this week such a great one!

<u>SPRINKLING WITH HOLY WATER</u>: We will be using a sprinkling rite at the beginning of Mass during the Easter season. The proper response to being blessed with holy water is to make the sign of the cross. When I sprinkled the palms on Palm Sunday, I noticed people doing a variety of things. I was somewhat surprised that many people didn't know what to do when they were sprinkled with holy water. The proper response to being blessed with holy water is to make the sign of the cross. The only time we genuflect is to the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle or the monstrance.

MISSIONARY APPEAL: This year our Missionary Appeal will be conducted by Sr. Christine Kosin, OSB, from AIM USA – Alliance for International Monasticism on the weekend of May 17-18. The Alliance for International Monasticism promotes cooperation and solidarity among monasteries throughout the world. AIM responds to the needs of monasteries in the developing world by supporting mission communities in their birth, growth, development, trials, and difficulties.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: The Anointing of the Sick was started 50 years ago as a way to better minister to those who were seriously ill and dying. Some of you may remember what the church called last rites. Last Rites was a sacrament that could be received only once in a lifetime and thus people waited until their last breath to receive it. Sometimes the priest arrived in time and sometimes he didn't. Priests even anointed dead bodies. The Catholic Church no longer has what is called "last rites." It has been replaced with the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. It is surprising that people 50 years later are still using the term "last rites" and even talking about the sacrament in terms that we stopped using 50 years ago.

The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is a healthy revision of

what was called Last Rites. The Anointing of the Sick can be received as many times as a person needs it, where last rites were given only once. The Anointing of the Sick still carries with it forgiveness of sins, a prayer for physical healing, and a prayer for strength in the midst of one's suffering. The Anointing of the Sick is intended to strengthen people in faith and hope in the midst of their struggle with illness and even death. We try to minister to people in their illness and suffering rather than just waiting until they are at the moment of their last breath. Today, a priest is not allowed to anoint someone who has died sacraments are for the living, not the dead. Anyone who has a serious or chronic illness, is preparing for major surgery, or who is struggling with a serious mental illness can, and should, be anointed. Even children who have sufficient use of reason to understand the effects of the sacrament can be anointed in case of serious or chronic illness. If you are not sure if the illness is serious or not, the person should be anointed. The sacrament can be received as many times as needed.

One of the things I started when I arrived here was what we call "First Friday Calls." Catholics who are sick or homebound are visited on the First Friday of each month to receive Communion and the Anointing of the Sick. Some people have taken advantage of this, and others have not. I have altered this so that one Friday I will visit those in Corry and the next month those in Union City. This gives people support in their illness and at times isolation. This is what the Anointing of the Sick is intended for. It prevents the cases where we try to find a priest at the last minute to anoint someone who is dying, because they have already been anointed.

If you, or some member of your family, is homebound, please have them call the parish office to be put on the First Friday List.




